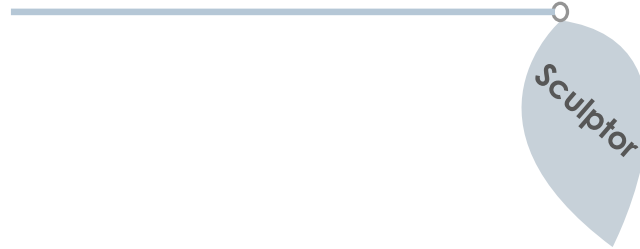

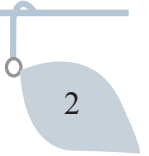

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Creative Brief

Project Summary

The purpose of this website is to provide an overview on the sculptor Alexander Calder. Content will include a short history of his life, a bit about his influences, a sampling of his artwork, and a short summary about what artistic movement his style reflected. This site is not intended to be an in-depth biography, but rather a brief look into the life of one of the well-known contemporary artists of the last century.

Design Summary

The design of the website itself will reflect the whimsical nature of the artist's mobile sculptures. The layout will use simplicity and white space to provide a classy appearance that will not draw attention away from the content. It will act like an image map, although assembled through div tags. Colors will be pastel or in gray scale for professionalism and to keep the site content in the foreground and the layout in the background. Text will be in Century Gothic. It is a sans-serif for easier readability, but has a very smooth, curvilinear feel that supports the flowing lines and mobile-navigation of the site.

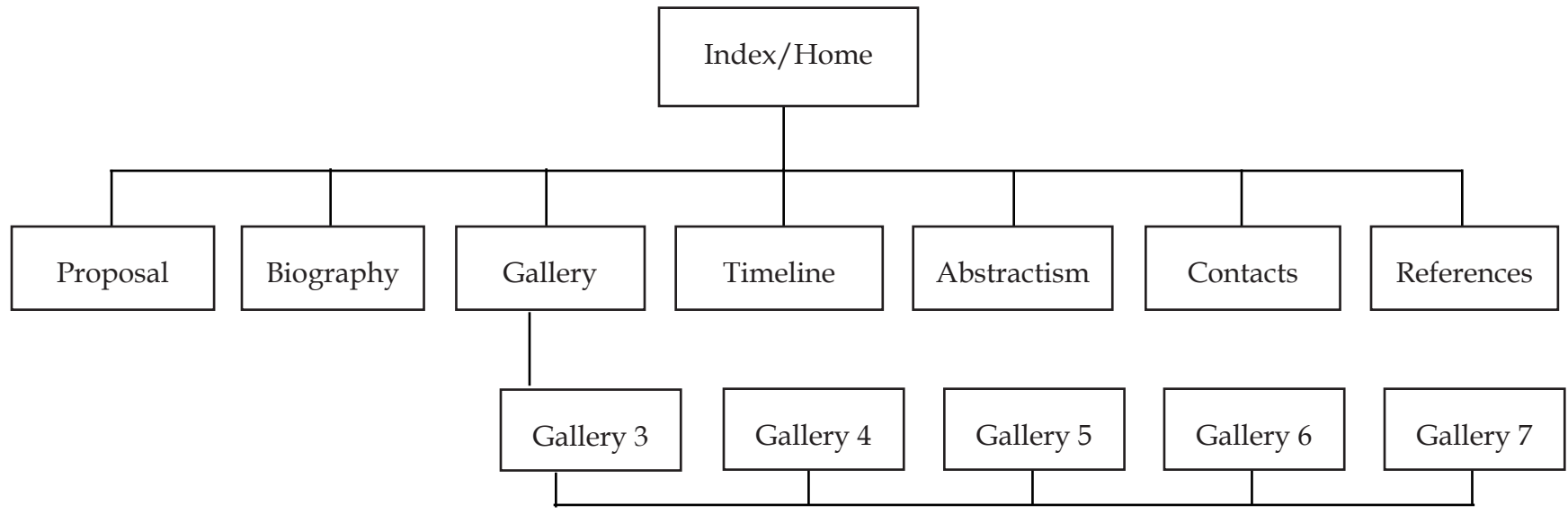

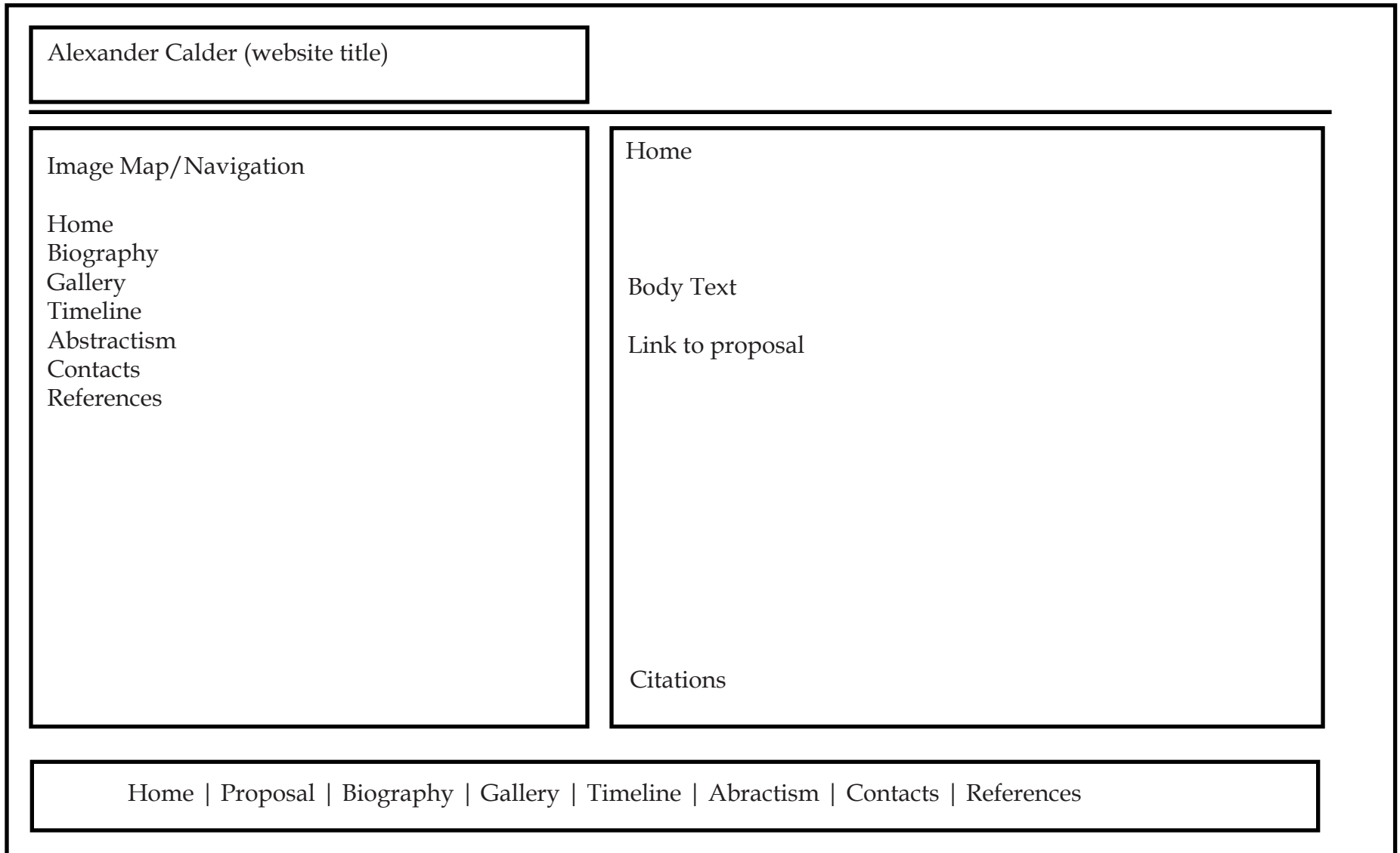

Home

In 1943, Albert Einstein attended the Museum of Modern Art to see Calder's *A Universe* motorized mobiles. He stood looking at it for forty-five minutes, waving away anyone who approached before he supposedly muttered, "I wish I had thought of that."¹

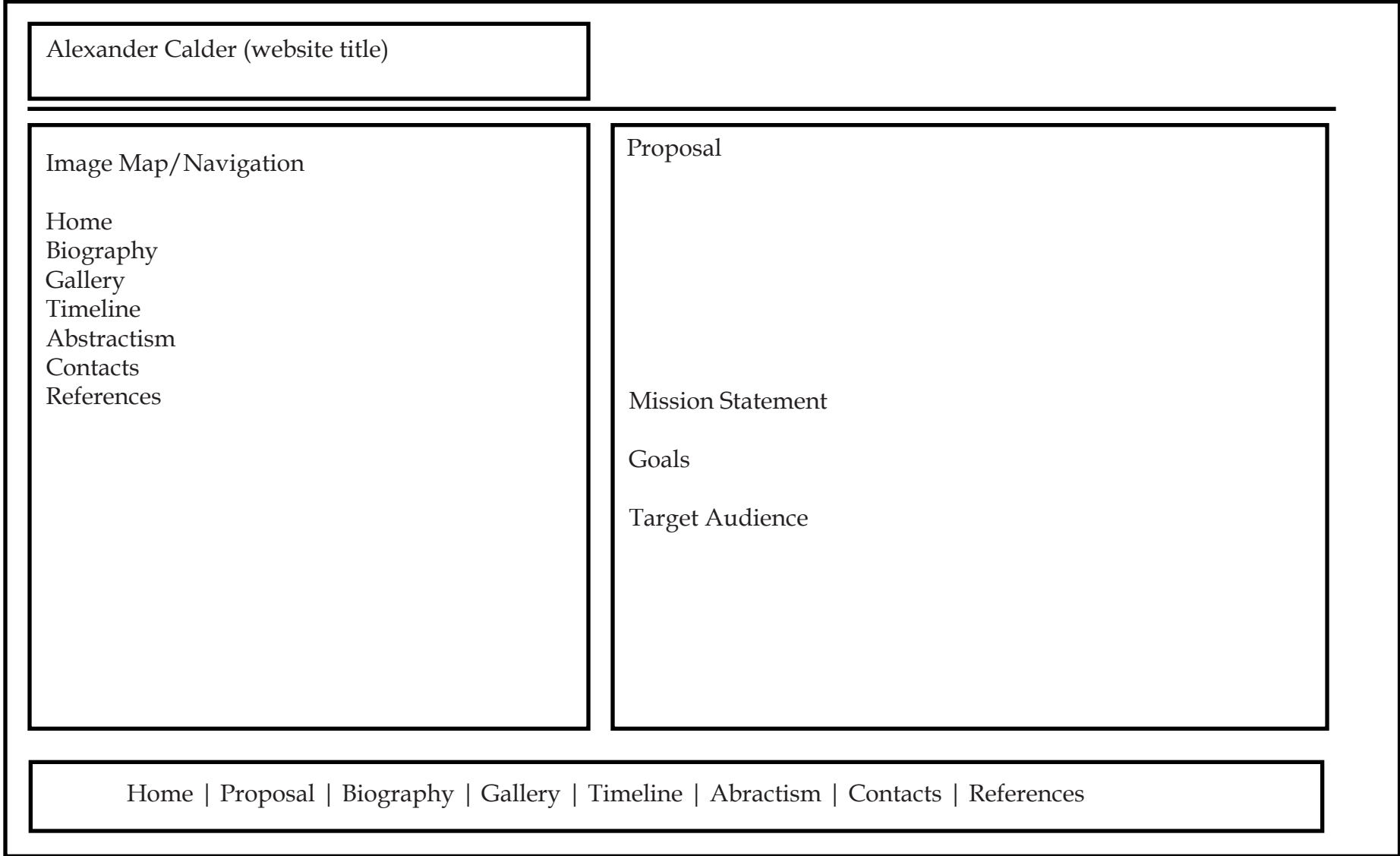
Alexander Calder was an American Sculptor credited with the invention of the mobile (moving sculptors). He had a simple, naturalistic style, which usually conveyed his fascination with the universe. Starting his career with mechanical engineering and painting, he later gave this up and turned to sculpting instead as his father and grandfather had done. Alexander Calder was one of the first abstract American sculptors to receive international recognition.²

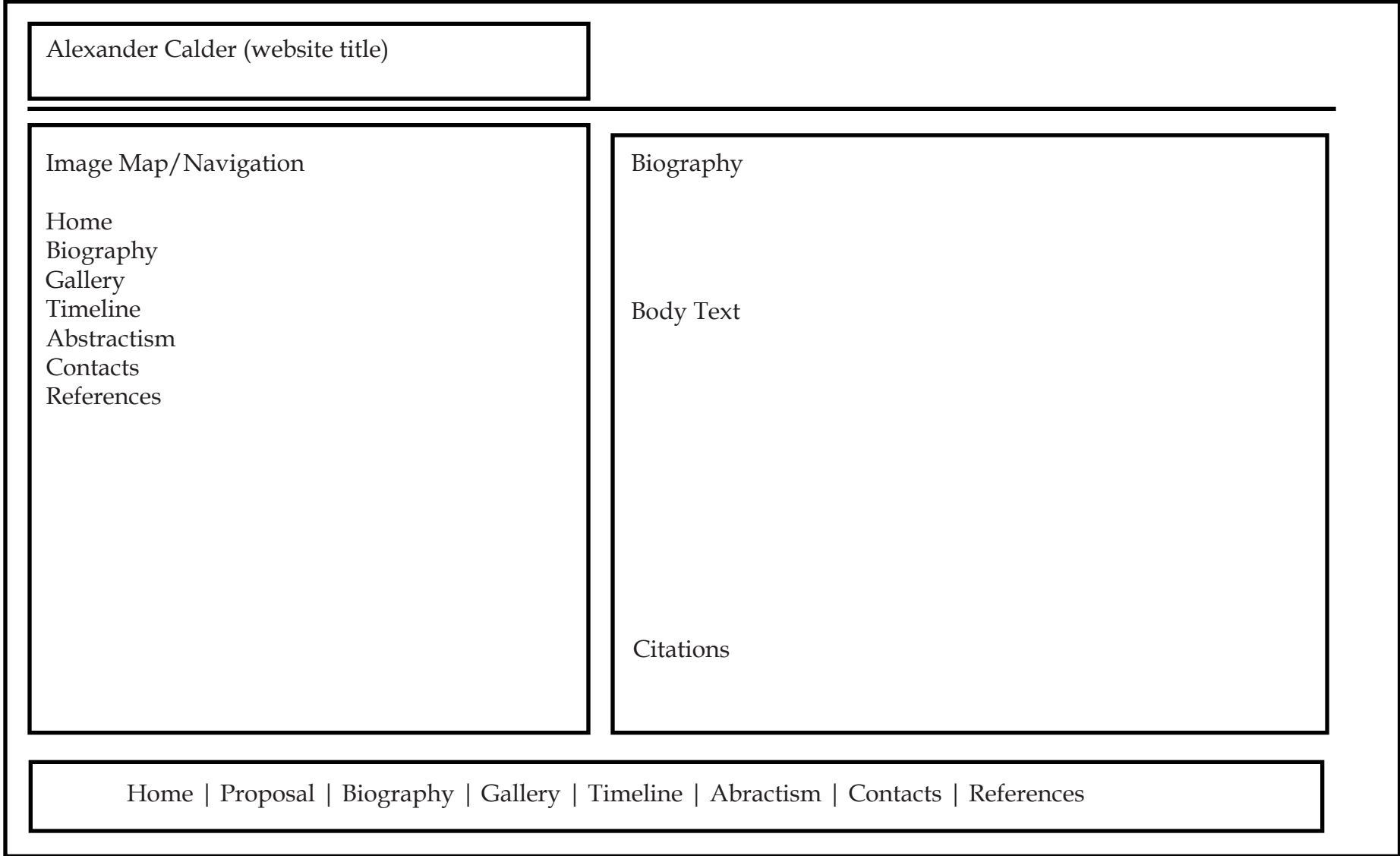

Biography

"The underlying sense of form in my work has been the system of the universe, or part thereof. For that is a rather huge model to work from" - Alexander Calder ¹

Alexander Calder was born in Philadelphia in 1898. Both his father and grandfather were successful sculptors of public monuments and his mother was a painter. At age six, Calder's father was diagnosed with tuberculosis and Calder and his sister were left with friend for a year, while his father recovered at a health ranch. The family was reunited in 1906 and relocated to Pasadena, California where it was warmer and better for his father's health. It was during this time that Calder took a great interest in the stars and planets, which are often reflected in his later work. ¹

After high school, Alexander enrolled in the Stevens Institute of Technology and graduated in 1919 with a degree in engineering. He worked several jobs after graduation, including hydraulics engineering and automotive engineering³, but finding those unfulfilling, he began work as a common seaman. This renewed his interest in the stars and cosmos. ¹

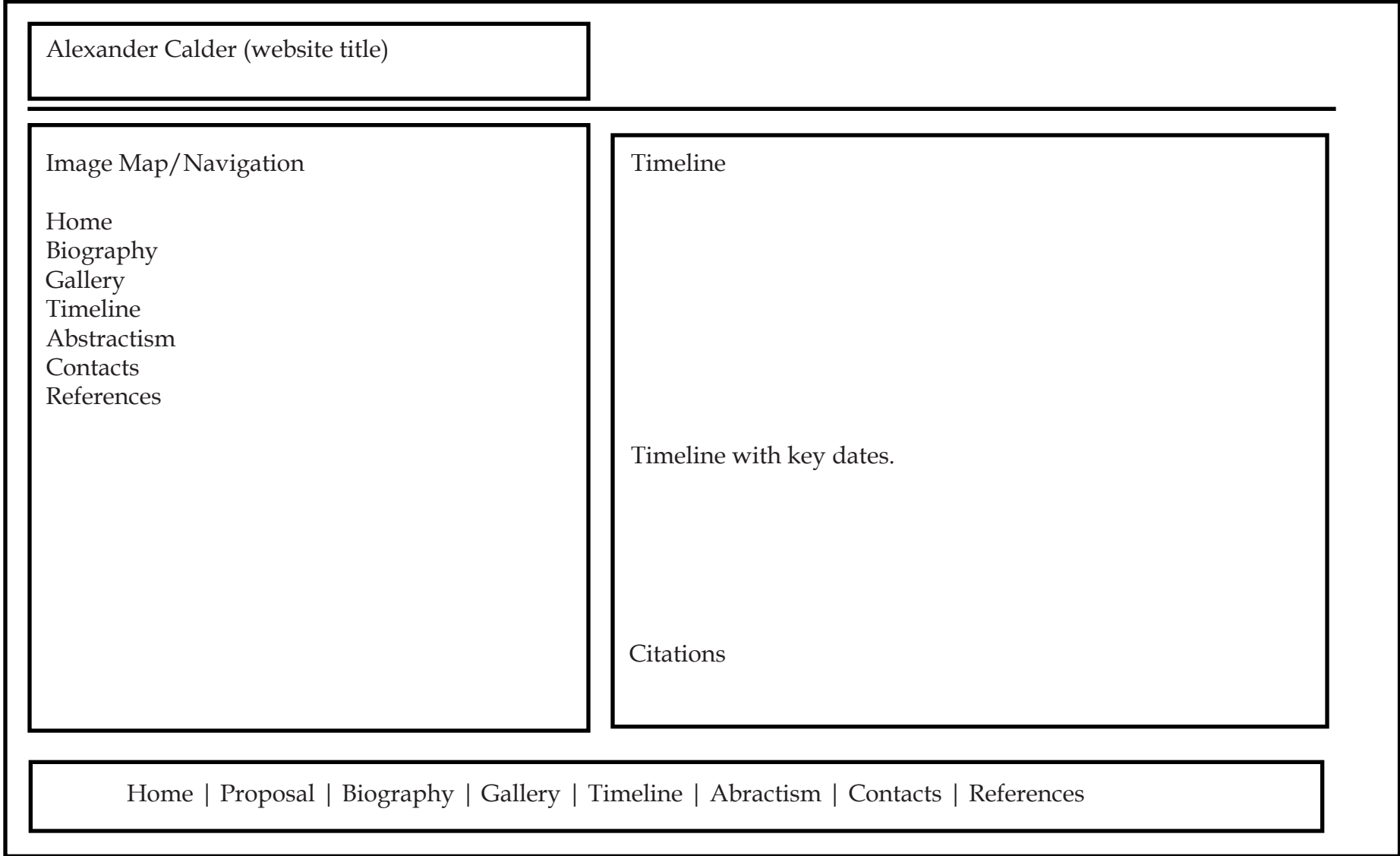
In 1923, he settled in New York and enrolled at the Art Students Lounge. He then worked his way over to Paris and by the end of the 1920s he was producing wire animals and portraits. ¹ Following work with the *National Police Gazette*, which had him doing sketches of the Barnum & Bailey Circus, Calder developed a strong interest in aspects of circuses. ³ Indeed, this may have contributed to his assemblage of the wire masterpiece the *Cirque Calder*, which consisted of 5 suitcases of wire props and performers¹ that could be manipulated manually by Calder. ³

January 1931 Calder married Lousia James who he met while on a passenger ship headed for New York in 1929. They settled in New York, but later purchased a house in Roxbury, Connecticut. They had two daughters Sandra and Mary. ¹

Autumn 1931, Alexander Calder initiated a truly new form of art by creating metal sculptures that ran on a system of cranks and motors. Marcel Duchamp gave these the title of mobiles. The central focus of Calder's mobiles was the universe and cosmic imagery. Upon realizing he could make stationary objects, which relied on wind currents - he practically gave up mobiles. These stationary objects were known as stabiles. ³

Alexander Calder passed away at age seventy-eight in 1976. ³

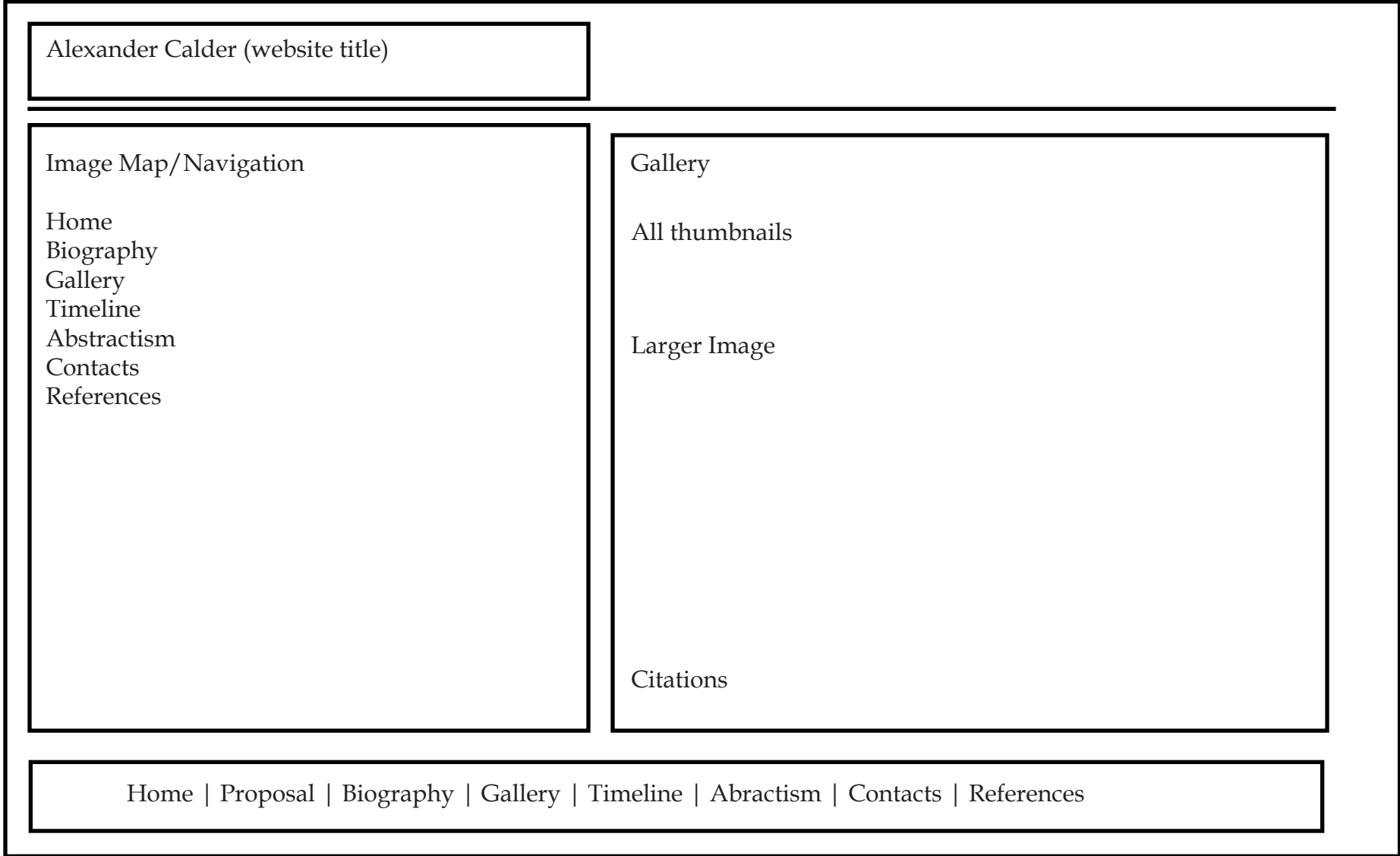

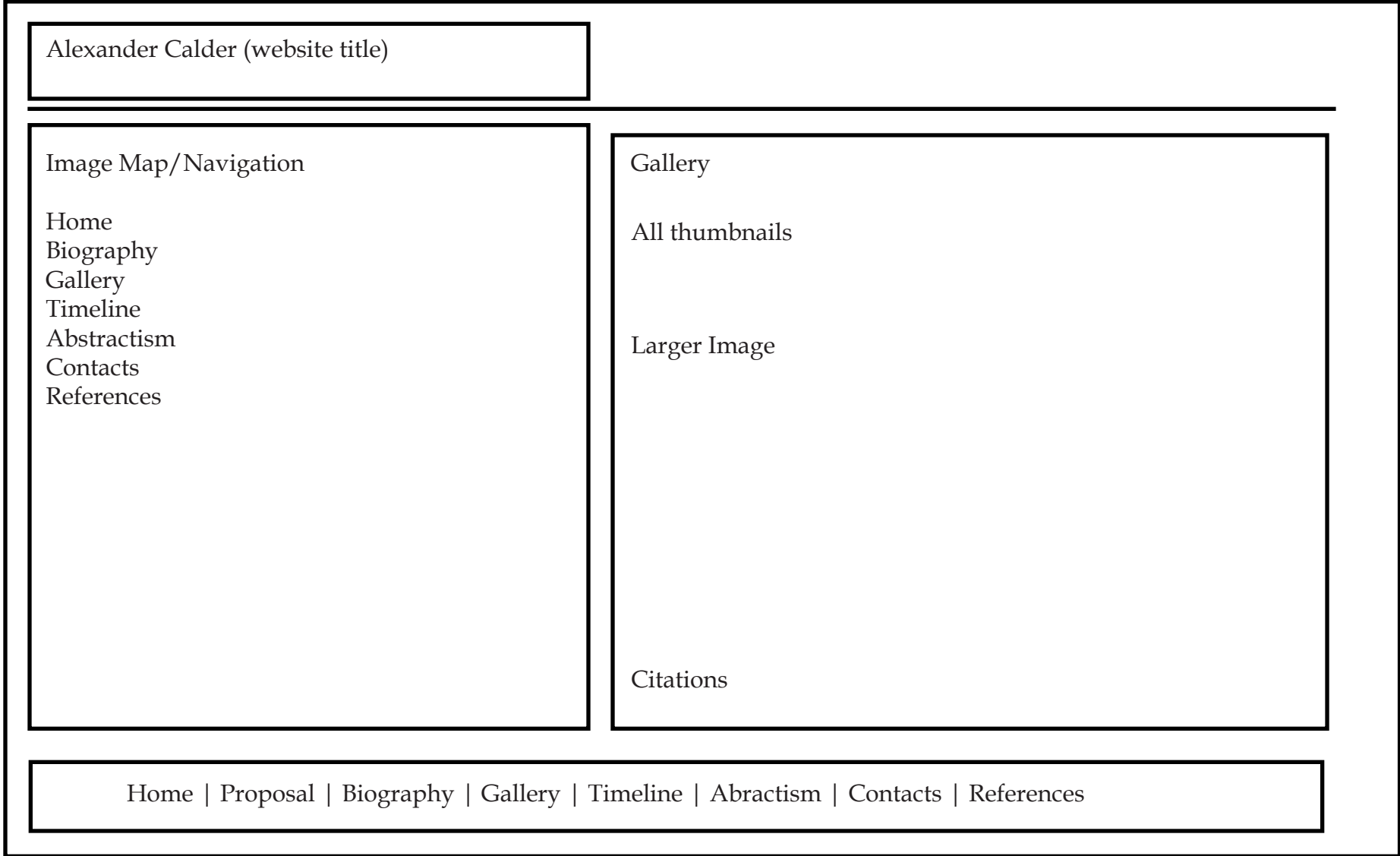

Abstractism

Through his performances of "the circus," Calder met Mondrian and grew very close to the other artist. It was after visiting Mondrian's studio that Calder realized he wanted to work in the abstract.¹

Abstractism is the opposite of naturalism and realism, which were about recreating life as accurately as possible through the artist's medium. Abstract is art that has been paired down or is pure. It is based on the idea that nature is perpetually in flux and the faster one paints to catch "the moment," the further the artist gets from accurate realism.⁴

Surrealism developed out of abstractism as a way to paint the unconscious. Artists were trying to give their work something that photography couldn't capture; realists just couldn't measure their artwork up against the accuracy of photography. Thus European artists developed the style of surrealism, which tried to represent dreams, fantasies, thoughts, and ideas. It was a movement about personal experience.⁴

The abstract art movement in America didn't pick up speed until World War II, when many of the famous European artists had to flee their native countries and ended up relocating in New York. Prior to this, American abstract art was primarily political or reflected "American values." This was known as regionalism.⁴

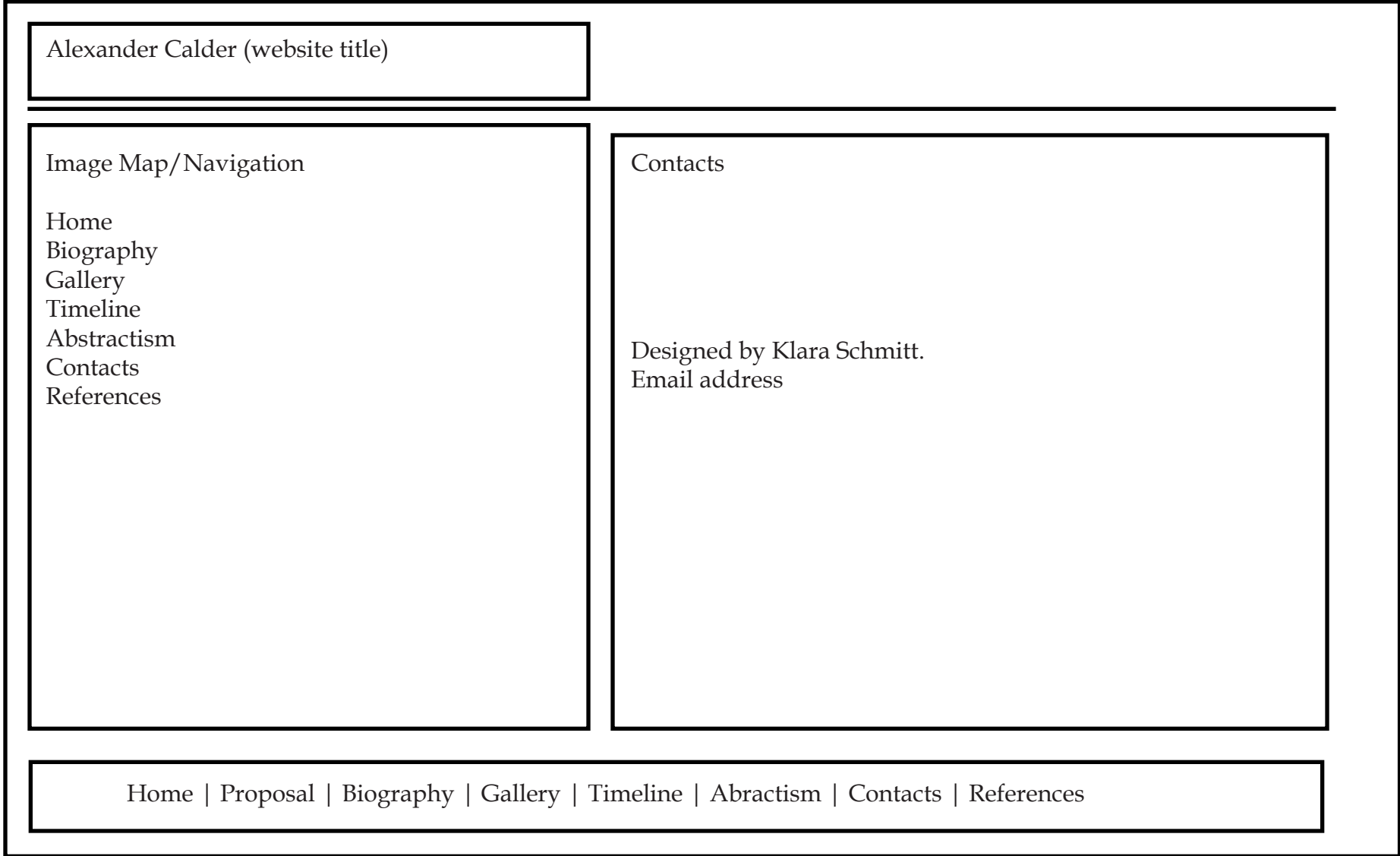
Although, surrealism was popular, the first real American movement was abstract expressionism, which was rooted in expressing pure emotion through the art as if the medium was a language itself. Characteristics of abstract expressionism include: creative use of brush stroke and texture, the use of large canvases, paying attention to space and proximity of objects, and catching accidents within the work⁵ through automatism.⁴

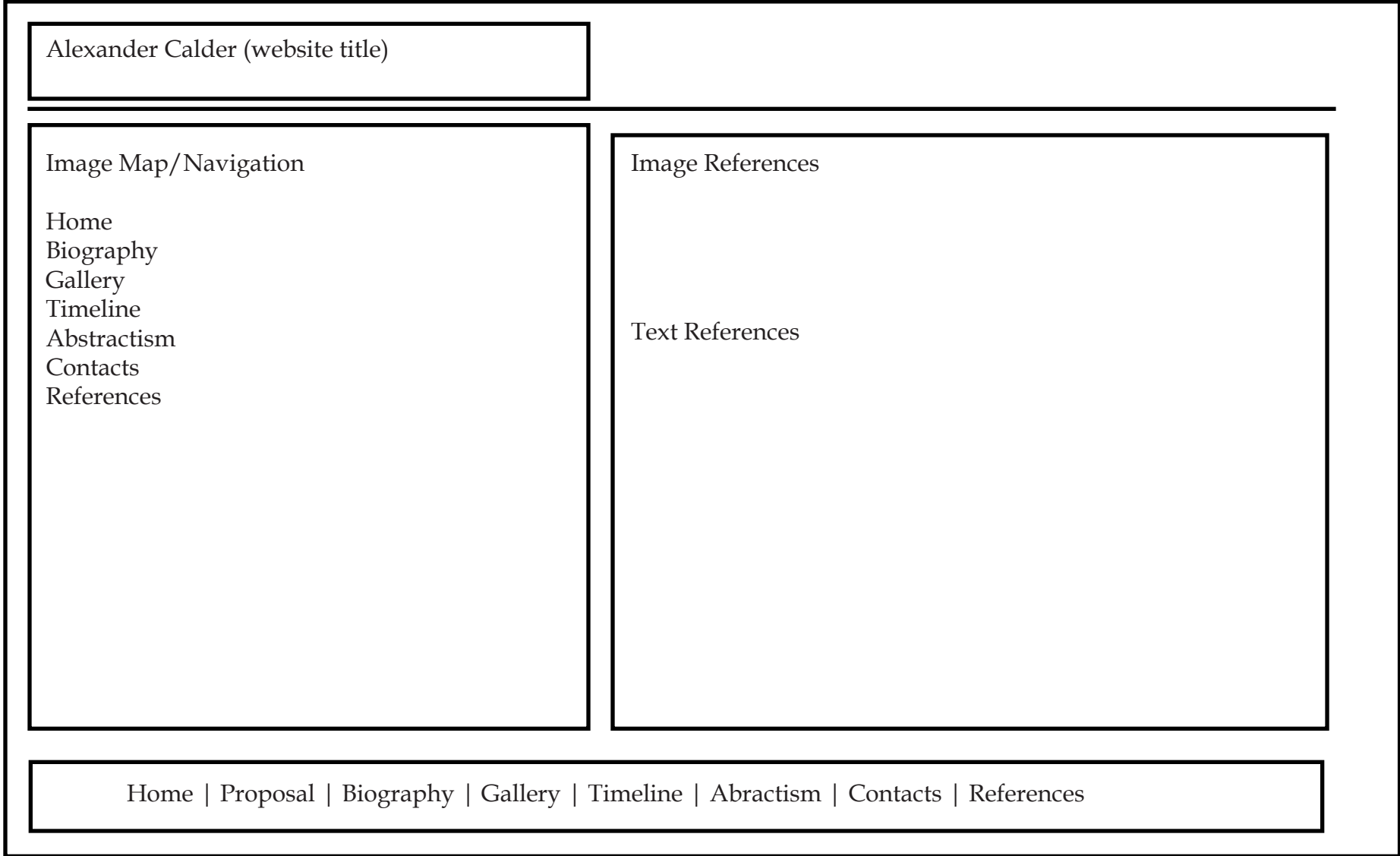


